HISTORIC TROLLEY BARNS

Downtown's New Center for Creativity and Innovation

- The Historic Trolley Barns are six buildings containing more than 80,000 square feet.
- The buildings offer tremendous natural light, brick walls and vaulted ceilings.



- Free parking at a ratio of four parking spaces per 1,000 square feet of office area are available on site.
- The Historic Trolley Barns at Rolling Mill Hill were added to the **National Register of Historic Places in November 2010**.
- The buildings were originally constructed in the 1940s by the Works Projects Administration (WPA) as part of The New Deal.
- The structures include bowed steel truss roof systems, original metal frame windows, stepped parapet rooflines, and decorative brick detailing.
- The Historic Trolley Barns housed various municipal public works departments until 2008.
- The Historic Trolley Barns are more than 75% leased. Tenants include
